8 Appointment - Scrubs Addressing the Firearm Epidemic

9 (SAFE) Presentation

10 | [Deniz Cataltepe, M.D., Director of Chapter

11 Development & Curriculum Development, Scrubs

12 Addressing the Firearm Epidemic, Inc., stated she is

13 a pediatrics resident at Children's Hospital of

14 Philadelphia (CHOP). She introduced Dr. Dorothy

15 Novick and Kimberly Sterner-Stein.

Dr. Cataltepe addressed the work they do at CHOP

17 regarding firearm storage, counseling patients and

18 their families, distributing gun locks to families

19 free of charge, and providing some education.

20 Dr. Cataltepe provided an overview of

21 why safe storage matters, the role of physicians, and

22 how to discuss this issue with patients and their

23 families.

24 Dr. Cataltepe addressed gun sales in the United

25 | States from 2000 to 2022. She reported gun sales

correlated with events and mass shootings that
coccurred, such as Sandy Hook in 2012 and San

Bernardino in 2015. She noted the biggest peak was
during the pandemic with the death of George Floyd
when many people took to the streets. She mentioned
that fear oftentimes drives people to purchase
weapons.

Dr. Cataltepe reported teen suicide has increased 4-10%, and they use family member weapons 82% of the time, noting a 90% completion rate associated with teen suicide by way of a firearm. She also noted unintentional firearm death and injury are four times higher and occur in the home 90% of the time. She pointed out that even toddlers can pull the trigger.

Dr. Cataltepe reported violent crime has increased, and 380,000 guns have been lost or stolen since the pandemic and used in violent crimes.

Dr. Cataltepe addressed gun safety, noting the least safe option is to have ready access to a weapon because they are worried about the risk of an intruder in the home or another imminent threat to their safety and keep the weapon loaded or unlocked next to their bed. She stated one step up from that would be that the weapon is unloaded but still very readily available, unlocked, and ammunition is

somewhere nearby. She reported the ideal scenario is to have the firearm locked away loaded or unloaded and separate from ammunition also locked away elsewhere in the home.

Dr. Cataltepe referred to studies regarding safe firearm storage that have shown a reduction in youth suicide, unintentional injury, and lost or stolen guns. She reported a 30% reduction in youth firearm death even with a modest increase in safe firearm storage.

Dr. Cataltepe noted that trigger locks are the simplest storage option because they are inexpensive and do not require the weapon to be unloaded as opposed to cable locks, which requires the weapon to be unloaded. She mentioned that safes are the most secure option, and biometric safes are available for ready access but expensive in the \$200 range.

Dr. Cataltepe addressed how to discuss safe storage with patients and their families. She discussed how she addresses the issue in the pediatric primary care setting and tells patients and their family that she is asking about it because they live in Philadelphia, where it is a public health issue that affects pretty much everyone.

Dr. Cataltepe noted the importance of talking

about this as a safety issue and to not use the term
gun control, so the issue remains collaborative. She
mentioned that the Board members practice many
different specialties and suggested they lean on
their own expertise within the realm of medicine as
opposed to speaking as if they were an expert on
firearms.

Dr. Cataltepe also mentioned the importance of being educated on local gun culture and local laws and having the option of distributing educational materials through their clinics or practices.

Dr. Cataltepe addressed questions providers may ask when the patient seems amenable to discussing firearms, including where the firearm is stored, if there are any children in the house and whether they know where the firearm is stored, and the reason they have the firearm.

Dr. Cataltepe noted it is totally fine if the patient does not want to discuss firearms. She also noted the provider can share that the discussion will remain confidential as long as there is no threat to their own safety or safety of others, emphasizing that they care about violence prevention. She mentioned that kids are exploratory and is the reason they might unintentionally find a weapon in the home.

She noted they could also discuss the risk of depression if teenagers around and whether a firearm is accessible to that teenager.

Dr. Cataltepe addressed the importance of discussing firearm training, self-defense laws, biometric safes, and safe storage with patients who have ready access to a weapon because they are concerned about self-protection.

Dorothy Novick, M.D., Practice-Based Scholar,

Center for Violence Prevention, Children's Hospital

of Philadelphia, noted a study showing the

distribution of a free locking device at the time of

counseling can make an enormous difference in moving

the needle toward encouraging people to store a

firearm safely and is where they can have the

greatest impact.

Dr. Yealy thanked and congratulated them on what they assembled and how they created an approach usable by many that starts with the actions that might change behavior.

Chair Woodland echoed Dr. Yealy's comments. He mentioned the importance of clinicians facilitating conversations regarding gun safety.

Dr. Udekwu mentioned being a pediatrician in Pittsburgh, noting it to be a difficult subject to

bring up but offering someone options as opposed to just discussing the issue makes a lot of sense. She reported not having that available to them at this point.

Chair Woodland mentioned the importance of raising awareness at the State Board of Medicine on a repetitive basis to heighten the issue even more.]

9 Report of Prosecuting Attorneys

[Heather J. McCarthy, Esquire, Senior Board Prosecutor and Board Prosecution Liaison, presented the Consent Agreement for Case No. 23-49-007245.

Chair Woodland asked whether there were any thoughts of continuing medical education and counseling that would be documented.

Ms. McCarthy noted that it could be considered if the Board finds it too lenient, where there may be continuing medical education (CME) on verbal communications with patients but were hoping that the criminal conviction was discipline enough as far as a deterrent for such future conduct.

Dr. Yealy commented that he understands the penalty regarding licensure, the duration of it, and its alignment with the criminal side. He noted they are permitting return to the practice of medicine

and cannot fully assess whether that, which is separate from the criminal punishment, is the appropriate matching of the offense and any particular licensure action.

Dr. Yealy mentioned that it is a negotiated agreement but requested Ms. McCarthy address it more due to the lack of detail available.

Ms. McCarthy noted the agreement would bring the matter to a close without the time of a hearing, but if it were to progress to a hearing, the Board would have more detail, including testimony from the doctor. She noted prosecution likes to resolve cases by a consent agreement when there is an agreed sanction that both sides feels is fair.

Ms. McCarthy mentioned that it is based on solely the low-level criminal conviction, third-degree misdemeanor, and somewhat minimal punishment he received in the criminal system.]

Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Status Report

[Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted she
and regulatory counsel are updating the list of
regulations for a future meeting.

Ms. Wucinski informed Board members that Act 53 final rulemaking was delivered to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission and the standing committees of the House and Senate on February 14, 2024. She noted all those who commented were also notified of the delivery and availability of the final-form rulemaking. She mentioned that it is posted on the Independent Regulatory Review Commission's (IRRC) website and is expected to be on IRRC's agenda for the public meeting on March 21, 2024.

Ms. Wucinski addressed Regulation 16A-4955 regarding physician assistants and provided comments from the public and IRRC for the Board's review.

Chair Woodland asked Ms. Wucinski to explain the concept of a substitute supervising physician because

most of them have affiliate physicians who participate in the institutional agreements.

Ms. Wucinski explained that the substitute supervising physician is what they refer to anybody who is not the primary supervising physician. She stated the way it currently works is if a physician assistant wants to practice in the absence of their primary supervising physician that they need to name substitute supervising physicians and then they can have numerous other substitutes that are on file with the facility or wherever they are practicing.

Ms. Wucinski mentioned that the Health Care
Facilities Act is a little bit different than
physician assistants who are practicing in a
healthcare facility because they do not have
substitutes. She stated their primary supervising
physician is whoever is the attending physician.

   International Women's Day celebrating the social,

for well over a century with the first gathering in 1911 supported by over a million people.

Chair Woodland noted March 2024 Health Awareness includes National Nutrition Month, National Colorectal Cancer Month, and National Women and Girls HIV/AIDS Awareness Day. He mentioned that Healthy People 2030 provides a lot of resources on their website.

Chair Woodland stated the Kaiser Family
Foundation (KFF) has put out a states' ranking by
physician assistants per 100,000 people for 2024,
noting Pennsylvania is in the top 20. He also noted
a states' ranking by primary care physicians per
100,000 people, again noting Pennsylvania ranked in
the top 10.

Chair Woodland informed everyone of a webinar series State of the States: What key health issues are in play this year? for anybody interested in looking at legislative affairs as they apply to state of the states and what key health care issues are in play. He mentioned one of their areas on the last month's agenda was the venue change and how it's impacted malpractice claims. He reported malpractice mega verdicts have hit a record high.

Chair Woodland informed Board members that he has

been involved in the two sets of recommendations and guidelines offered at the Annual FSMB Meeting this He noted one to be the physicians in training recommendations and guidelines to help modernize some of the approaches to how they approach physicians in training as it relates to regulation and licensure. He reported the second is artificial intelligence in medicine and professional regulation recommendations and quidelines.

Chair Woodland noted he is the Chair of the FSMB Ethics and Professionalism Committee and offered to provide Board members with several highlights hopefully at the next meeting. He reported that a historic memorandum of understanding signed between the International Association of Medical Regulatory Authority (IAMRA) and the World Health Organization occurred on Monday, February 19, 2024.

Chair Woodland explained that the memorandum identified evidence as it relates to research in healthcare workforce regulation, inclusion of regulatory perspectives and areas of development by the World Health Organization, the provision of technical support for capacity building in medical regulation, closer collaboration and sponsorship in dealing with low- and middle-income countries, and

the development of educational webinar series to focus on issues of medical regulators in low- and middle-income series.

Chair Woodland noted that the 2025 Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) awards are open and recognizing notable designated officials and program directors, coordinators, residents, and fellows for their outstanding work and contributions.

Chair Woodland also noted the Association of
American Medical Colleges (AAMC) has come out with
their strategic plan and includes strengthening
medical education, supporting students, focus on
inclusivity, diversifying tomorrow's doctors,
strengthening the research environment, evolving
leadership skills, improving access of care,
advancing knowledge, promoting health equity and
health justice, and adapting to change.

Chair Woodland provided websites and resources to many of the items listed in his report.]

21 Report of Vice Chair

[Donald M. Yealy, M.D., Vice Chair, stated he would like to seek the input of not only people who were on the call or in person in Harrisburg, but those who might read the minutes so that the Board of Medicine could understand and become more informed about the
positions and views of not only the people they serve
who are seeking care but also those who are
delivering care that falls underneath the State Board
of Medicine about late career practitioner
assessments and practice evaluation.

Dr. Yealy stated the Board currently does not have a specific position and mentioned that there are concerns across the country as to whether or not these should exist and whether cognitive and/or physical abilities should be assessed at a specific age.

Dr. Yealy asked whether there should be a pattern regarding the best way to balance the safety and fairness issues to the providers and all of the other concerns. He mentioned that it is not the goal of the Board to create a particular position or call for any specific legislative action but to understand the individuals providing the care and also the interest of citizens from the Commonwealth.

Dr. Yealy noted everyone agrees that they want the best possible care provided to citizens of the Commonwealth by individuals who can function underneath the licensure as it exists right now. He informed everyone that a federal evaluation has been

ongoing for almost six years based on some concerns

at Yale University and the medical center. He

mentioned that it has not been adjudicated yet but

will be informative.

Dr. Yearly noted looking forward to any input to help inform any conversations that the Board might have at a future meeting.

Chair Woodland noted he has been looking at nodal points in transitioning from different aspects of a medical career from undergraduate medical education into graduate medical education, graduate medical education into fellowship or practice, and then the next nodal point that is not always discussed is the transitioning at the end of a person's career.

Chair Woodland stated the American College of Surgeons has looked at competency, especially surgical competency, as it relates to aging. He noted fatigue and those issues have been addressed as it relates to aging as well, which are other things they have to evaluate.

Dr. Kutz agreed stated the American College of Surgeons has also talked about duty hours, noting other professional organizations have established guidelines for this, but physicians have not, particularly surgeons.

Dr. Kutz reported that the American Society of Anesthesia has guidelines and advanced practitioners have guidelines but surgeons have made this an individual call on their own. He noted prior discussion as to whether there should be some sort of parameter in place or a policy, whether it be state or federal, to kind of guide this as it moves forward because it is going to continue to be an issue.]

10 Report of Acting Commissioner

[Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, informed Board members that the timeline for the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) replacement has been moved back from the end of 2024 to the spring of 2025.

Acting Commissioner Claggett noted the Board room is pretty bare and invited local Board members to participate in person, along with the folks in the public.

Chair Woodland commented that the State Board of Medicine Meeting is valuable for everybody and invited everyone to attend in person. He mentioned that COVID opened the virtual window, and the window is not going to close. He noted appreciation for everyone who attended in person and online.

Acting Commissioner Claggett informed everyone that the Board is open for business and willing to engage in conversations with stakeholders to discuss their concerns or just talk about anything they may want to discuss. He reported having a meeting scheduled with the Pennsylvania Medical Society (PAMED) to discuss some items.

Acting Commissioner Claggett addressed his participation, along with Mr. Ali and Ms. Wucinski, a couple months ago at the Penn State College of Medicine's Project Medical Education, where they were trained to be a doctor in one day. He noted the medical students shared their dreams and how important it is for them to get their license quickly. He mentioned taking notes and doing an internal processes review to make sure people receive their license as quickly as possible.

Lauren Chambers, D.O., requested information regarding the status of the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact (IMLC). She mentioned that she did her fellowship in Pennsylvania and has been looking to return to the state. She noted being an IMLC member, and her state of primary licensure is in Utah. She stated legislation passed the IMLC for Pennsylvania in 2016 but that it has been

approximately eight years without any finalization.

Dr. Chambers informed Board members that every state in the country except Pennsylvania has a contact phone number, email, or both on their website for anyone who has questions or inquiries. She noted contacting the State Board of Osteopathic Medicine and was told to do her own search on the Pennsylvania Department of State.

Dr. Chambers mentioned reviewing minutes from six meetings since 2018 but that it was not very clear as to what has delayed the implementation of the IMLC. She noted locating Dr. Woodland's practice after searching for someone who attended the meetings and was provided a response by Dr. Woodland concerning the timeline of the IMLC.

Dr. Chambers read Dr. Woodland's response verbatim. "The Board is not currently confirming any specific time frames. The implementation process is still tentative and can be subject to change based on the process being adopted to our licensing system."

She noted the response was vague and presented to the Board to request more information regarding the delay.

Dr. Chambers addressed why the IMLC would be beneficial to the state of Pennsylvania. She

reported the general turnaround time for obtaining a medical license in Pennsylvania is approximately four to six months and does not include the empanelment process or obtaining hospital privileges, none of which can start until after their medical license. She also reported the new graduate season seems to delay the process by approximately one to three months further with return to baseline around November.

Dr. Chambers addressed long wait times when calling the State Board of Medicine that can be as long as 2 hours on Sundays. She mentioned not being able to necessarily speak to an evaluator but speaking with someone who provides the status, noting there may be a deficiency or a missing item, where oftentimes the item has actually already been submitted and then be reported that the evaluator has to locate that item, which can delay the process by another month.

Dr. Chambers stated the main delay seems to be getting the file to an evaluator, because once the file is with an evaluator, it generally is processed within about two to three weeks. She expressed concern with the Board being understaffed given the long turnaround time, long hold time, and it takes so

long for a file to get to an evaluator.

Dr. Chambers commented that understaffing creates barriers for physicians to relocate to Pennsylvania and leads to reduced healthcare coverage for patients. She referred to Becker's Physician Leadership, noting Pennsylvania is the fifth state with the highest medically underserved areas and mentioned that physicians may be going to work in another state.

Dr. Chambers informed Board members that she applied to do her fellowship in 2019 but almost did not get to complete it because her application for a medical license had not been processed by the Board in time for her to start. She believed the credentialing coordinator had to contact their government representative to get assistance processing her cohort class for her to even start.

Dr. Chambers also informed Board members that she recently looked into applying for locum tenens positions and also had a contract to return for a permanent position in Pennsylvania within the past couple of weeks but ultimately declined the permanent position because she was not sure when she would get her medical license and cannot not work for six months.

Dr. Chambers stated she took a permanent position in a state that is not IMLC but has a faster processing time. She noted also accepting a locum tenens provider position in the interim in an IMLC state, and it took two days to receive her medical license. She mentioned being a perfect example of a physician that Pennsylvania lost who otherwise would have been in Pennsylvania providing coverage for patients.

Dr. Chambers addressed the inequity of processing the applications among large healthcare systems. She stated Pennsylvania State has expressed that they have a contact at the Board and are able to get licenses processed in a matter of weeks if working a locum tenens position, whereas applying for a locum tenens position at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC) may take up to six months and sometimes have to reach out to their government representatives to expedite applications once a physician is signed because they do not have a contact.

Dr. Woodland thanked Dr. Chambers for the extensive review of the issue, noting the Board is supportive but is the process to get it across that affects other states as well.

Ms. Walter also thanked Dr. Chambers for the very thorough analysis of the issues. She informed Dr. Chambers that the Board is aware that it has been several years since the IMLC was passed by the legislature, and the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) is working diligently on implementing either the IMLC partially or fully.

Ms. Walter stated Pennsylvania has partially implemented the nurse compact and is aware of the urgency related to the need for healthcare providers and the interest that providers have in Pennsylvania becoming an IMLC state.

Ms. Walter explained that the IMLC requires
Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) background
checks to be procured by the individual states who
are acting as states of principal licensure. She
mentioned that some states fully implemented the IMLC
and then were told by the United States Department of
Justice that they were not able to obtain the
background checks as they had been doing from the
FBI, so they had to walk back their implementation.

Ms. Walter noted Pennsylvania is working with state and federal partners on a solution that will allow them to obtain all of the information that is required for participation in the IMLC. She also

noted they understand the urgency and are doing their best. She invited Dr. Chambers to reach out to her or Attorney Wucinski for any progress.

Acting Commissioner Claggett addressed processing times and stated one of the primary reasons why PALS is being replaced is because PALS allows for partial submission of applications. He reported experiencing times where there are 100 applicants and 50 of that 100 submit a completed application and the other 50 submit a partial application.

Acting Commissioner Claggett stated staff created delays because they were reviewing both sets of applications. He noted they are going to attach a completion percentage to each application, so all of the applications that have a score of 100, meaning that all their requirements have been met, will be processed first. He also noted that folks who do not have a score of 100 will receive a weekly email outlining what items are still missing.

Acting Commissioner Claggett reported currently having only four applications for the State Board of Osteopathic Medicine in the system that are 100% complete and the rest are missing items.

Dr. Woodland informed Dr. Chambers that he appreciated her communications and thorough

Ms. Reddy noted this year's theme is joy and justice, and there will be several panel discussions around environmental justice, maternal health and health equity policy innovations. She informed everyone that an in-person and virtual option is available, and the registration deadline is March 22. She offered to drop a link to the health summit registration page.

Chair Woodland referred to the cyberattack on ePrescribing (eRx), noting it can impact care
delivery, but did not believe the Department of
Health had any guidelines as of yet. He mentioned
that institutions are developing workarounds on their
own.

Ms. Reddy stated there is no guidance at this time but is hoping to have a more detailed update in

the coming months.

Catherine Policina, M.D., stated her hospital wanted to submit a J-1 visa application, but that area was withdrawn from the health professional shortage area (HPSA) list. She noted being told that a lot of areas in Pennsylvania were withdrawn from HPSA and are negotiating with the Department of Health so that the list can be updated.

Ms. Reddy informed Dr. Policina that the Department of Health is aware of that and are currently in negotiations. She offered to provide more information through the Board or at the next Board meeting after speaking with experts on that matter.

Dr. Policina reported being told that they do not know the specific timeline as to when it can be updated. She noted their training is going to end by June and do not know whether they are coming back to their country first or waiting for that update to file their waivers.

Chair Woodland thanked Ms. Reddy for addressing the issue for Dr. Policina.]
